Thank you for your kind letter of support and solidarity. Your sentiments are warmly reciprocated by all members of ASI.

New Zealand is in total lockdown for the next 4 weeks in the hope of halting community transfer before it escalates and our ICU wards are overwhelmed. Thankfully this has not happened yet, and we are confident that the lockdown will stem the exponential rise in cases we are now seeing. Australia may not be far off. University campuses and schools are closed in New Zealand, and no-one can venture out on the streets without good reason. This parallels the effective approach adopted by China. As an interesting aside, our Chinese students now want to return home believing it is safer there. Undergraduate and postgraduate teaching continues on-line and surprisingly, this seems to be working. Our IT systems have not collapsed under the strain. All I can say is thank heavens for Zoom! While all non-essential research has been halted in New Zealand, immunology research into Covid19 has ramped up and is strongly supported by government. All our animals are being well cared for and any long-term animal experiments can continue. The biggest challenge we face is access to overseas reagents and supplies.

In Australia, while University's are still open, it is in a very limited way and currently researchers are being encouraged to scale back or wind down their operations. While there is a concerted effort to project valuable resources, such as important mouse strains, this is becoming more difficult.

While it is nice to have immunology at the very forefront of our national thinking, I can think of less stressful ways to achieve it.

It is times like these when we truly value the open dialogue, support and collaboration of our global colleagues. We as scientists and clinicians must work as a single community since as you say, we are in this together and it is up to us to come up with a solution. Quite frankly a solution to Covid19 will not be achieved without international collaboration and the open sharing of information, reagents and supplies.

Thank you once again for your message which has been distributed to all our members.
